




MAFIA - the name

Possible origin Language/Dialect:	Term:	Approximate meaning:
- Arabic	maha mahyas mu'afa ma'afir marfud	 quarry, cave bold man, braggart, arrogant safety, protection Arab tribe that ruled Palermo to reject, to refuse
- Greek	morphe	- beauty, strength
- Tuscan - Florentinian - Piedmontese	malfuso maffia, mafia mafi, mafio, mafiun	 - infidel, miscreant, impious, scoundrel rogue - poverty, deprivation - little, badly shaped, disfigured - also: rude, rough, careless, stubbornly silent
- Sicilian	mafiusu, marfusu maffie	- arrogant, bully - also: bold, brave, courageous, handsome - name for quarries, caves (near Trapani and Marsala)

Cosa Nostra – Code of Silence

Omertà - from umiltà, humility

- silence (seeing nothing, hearing nothing, saying nothing)
- very powerful concept, mental frame, behavioral attitude
- present from old times in southern Italian society
- mafiosi are prodigiously good at keeping their mouth shut
- mafiosi prefer not to say anything
- mafiosi do not say or ask any more than they absolutely have to
- what mafiosi say is never idle chat
- mafiosi communicate in codes, hints, fragments of phrases, significant silences
- interpretation of signs, messages, gesture, and silences is one of the mafioso main activities

- when initiated a man of honor swears to keep absolute secret

- when initiated a man of honor swears never to lie to another man of honors
 - truth is a precious and dangerous commodity for mafiosi
 - there is an obligation to tell the truth, but there is also a great reserve
 - reserve, the things that are not said, rule like irrevocable curse over all mafiosi
 - a well-disguised lie can be a very powerful weapon
 - a mafioso lives in terror of being judged by internal malicious gossip
 - relationships are made profoundly false, and absurd

- repentance is rare among mafiosi



Cosa Nostra – Code of Honor

- honor is about loyalty and obedience

- the new loyalties of mafioso are more important than blood ties

- the interest of cosa nostra is above those of his kin

honor accumulates through obedience
nothing can be considered inherently dishonorable, including killing
if the order is murdering women, children, relatives, it would be considered dishonorable not to obey

- mafiosi are obsessed with the rules of honor that limit their action

- the code of honor is much more than a list of rules
- becoming a man of honor means taking a whole new identity
- becoming a man of honor means entering a different moral universe
- a mafioso's honor is the mark of that new identity, that new moral sensibility
- entering the mafia is something similar to convert to a religion (be reborn)
- many mafiosi are believers
- leaving the mafia is not contemplated

Cosa Nostra – Initiation

Admission


- an aspiring mafioso is carefully watched, supervised, put to test
- committing murder is almost always a prerequisite for admission




- the candidate holds a burning sacred picture (usually Madonna)
- while swearing allegiance and silence until death
- swears obedience, the first pillar of the code of honor

- the burning of a sacred image symbolizes his death as an ordinary man and his rebirth as a man of honor

- the initiation ritual shows that honor is a status that has to be earned











Anonimous, The Maffiusi of Vicaria Prison, 1863

Baron Turrisi Colonna, Public Security in Sicily, 1864

L. Franchetti, S. Sonnino, Sicily in 1876

- a play in Sicilian dialect about the life of inmates

- the first ever study of mafia

- first official use of the term mafia

- revealed mafia as a secret organization

- analysis of political conditions and peasants

P. Mascagni, Rustic Chivalry (Cavalleria Rusticana), 1890 - an opera presenting a myth about Sicily and the mafia

A. Nocifero, Contemporary Barbarian Italy, 1897 - pejorative coloring to commonplaces about the Sicilian psyche

Sangiorgi, Report, 1900

- first official police report on mafia in Sicily
